- Maintain financial records


Secretary

Family Science Review – Editors' Corner

I continue to work and adapt our processes with the publication of the journal. While I could focus on the challenges and barriers we have faced throughout the last year since I took over as editor-in-chief, a temptation that could easily lead me down a rabbit hole of challenges due to covid 19, changing expectations of faculty workload, new technology and platforms, and a desire to build the status and impact of the *Family Science Review*, I would like to utilize the editor's corner over the next few months to highlight the progress toward the goals presented at the NCFR meeting.

We are in the final stage of addressing the manuscripts that were stalled during the transition and the pandemic. This process has allowed analysis of factors that cause delays and will inform more changes in the submission of manuscripts and the decision and editing process. While there were delays, the integrity of the review process has been maintained. In addition, the online first publication process has been established and several ideas for a swifter turnaround from review to publication are being tested.

The online first publication process is going to maximizes the expertise of our wonderful webmasters and will provide a process for long term maintenance of the documentation of the copy right and sustainability of the archives. Jenn and Catherine, our newly re-elected webmasters, have explored new possibilities of cross referencing the journal, so with the new processes and a goal of shorter time to publication, we hope to meet the threshold of publications for expansion into new databases and greater readership.

The next special issue, "<u>Family Science Careers through the Eyes of Theory</u>," will be devoted to theoretical and practice papers which reveal how family science professionals apply family theories in an array of professional contexts; if you are still considering submitting, there is still time! Research in Family Science is critical and I hope you will consider the *Family Science* Review for publication of your research in the future.
